3.18 Filmed or Fiched Manuscripts, Commercial Publications

Many materials from academic and state archives are being commercially filmed for widespread distribution. Typically, they are cited as a publication. Within data-management software, they will usually fit the QuickCheck Model for BOOK: BASIC FORMAT (chapter 12).

The first example below treats a film edition of manuscripts from a single archive, the Draper Manuscripts previously discussed at 3.1. The film edition follows the same organization used for the original collection. The second example uses a film edition of manuscripts assembled from many different archives.

CITING EDITION VS. PUBLICATION

These terms carry different meanings. With the Draper Manuscripts, the microfilm offers a new version of an already-existing entity—it is a microfilm *edition* of a collection of manuscripts housed at the Wisconsin Historical Society. The Southern Women microfilm, however, is not just a new edition of an entity that already existed. It is a totally new entity, a *publication* created by the publishers from records scattered across many locales—material not previously assembled.
